Dearest Congregation,

It is with sincere pleasure to tell you a little about the services lined up for August.

Our theme for the month is our principal, "The Inherent Worth and Dignity of Every Person."

August 2nd we will hear Rev. Anna Wilson. She has been coming to our church over the last few months. Rev. Wilson is a minister with the Disciples of Christ denomination. She and her husband. Bob, adopted four children who now range in ages from 13-22. Over the years, Ana served in youth ministry, chaplaincy, and congregational leadership as Senior Minister. Her favorite type of ministry is pastoral care where she cares for the "least of these." She is currently serving as a PRN Chaplain for Arkansas Hospice while she looks for a church to call her as their minister. The title of her sermon is "Redeeming 24601: Moving Beyond Prison". How many prison, boxes, or labels do we live in? How many prisons do others place us in? More importantly, what prisons do we place others in with no hope of redemption? Do our prejudices hold us and others captive? We will discover the dignity of all human life by moving beyond the prisons, boxes and labels.



August 9th The Many and Varied Benefits of Eating Locally, AND Locavore Potluck. Our guest speaker will be Karen Holcolmb, Manager of Spa City Co-op. Our program on ethical eating will be followed by a Locavore Potluck. LOCAVORE POTLUCK? A locavore is a person who eats foods grown locally whenever possible, so bring a dish to share using one or more ingredient that was grown locally.

Karen Holcomb came to Hot Springs in 2003 from Austin, TX, where there was a thriving culture of local sourced food production. Spoiled to having fresh grass-fed meats, eggs, cheeses, organic produce and artisan produced goods, she and other friends conspired to bring such goodies to Hot Springs, and formed Spa City Co-op, an on-line farmer's market, in 2008. Karen has served as President, treasurer, and market manager for that organization ever since.

The granddaughter of "East Texas dirt farmers", Karen has made it her mission to advance the cause of farmers and small producers. She was a panel speaker at the 2012 Southern Alternative Agriculture Conference in Little Rock, and has served as a speaker to the Garvan Gardens Continuing Education program, The Hot Springs Women's Gardening Club, and several others. She plans a radio show on KUHS-LP in the fall of 2015 focusing on local live music, and community-based agriculture.

Karen is fond of saying that the only people who need to be concerned about the sources of their food are those who eat. (Continued next page)

August 23rd Intrigued by the ideals of Transcendentalism, Barbara Thexton chose this topic to explore with her fellow church members. Research has proved that this nineteenth century literary, philosophical movement is even more complex and intriguing than imagined. Transcendentalism greatly influenced early Unitarianism in America...more of the mystery will be revealed in her talk on Sunday, August 23. A Unitarian since 1960, when she shed her gloomy Baptist tenets in Austin, Texas, she later was courted by gentleman Peter Thexton in the Summit, New Jersey Unitarian Church where they were married in 1975. Ardent Unitarians, after the move to Arkansas seventeen years ago, registering to vote was first priority; then, they next sought the local Unitarian Church.

At the age of 35, Barbara enrolled as a freshman undergraduate in New Jersey and earned her M.S. in corporate interior design at Pratt Institute. During her career in Washington, D.C., she coordinated with architects in designing space plans for corporations, legislators, attorneys, and even a project for the chilling interior of the National Rifle Association.

A retiree, she is currently (again) chair of the Garland County Democratic Committee and is wondering how there was ever time to have a career.


August 30th we'll have an executive meeting followed by a Potato Bar potluck.



A Note from UUA's Rev. Peter Morales

Last summer, the news was filled with stories about the thousands of unaccompanied children coming across the US border, fleeing violence and poverty in Central America. Inspired to make a difference, more than twenty ministers joined us in Tucson for our first Clergy Border Witness that fall.

The publicity has faded since last summer, but the reality remains unchanged — and desperate. Children and families are still being deported, regardless of the deepening peril they face in their home countries. Our border has become a militarized zone, and violence has increased as our government pressures Mexico to turn back migrants no matter what their ages or circumstances.

This continuing crisis cries out for a response from people of faith. Please join us this November 2-7, to bear witness to the continuing human rights abuses on the US Mexico Border. UUA President Peter Morales, UUMA Executive Director Don Southworth, and Director of the UU College of Social Justice Kathleen McTigue will lead this delegation.

Together, we will walk a migrant trail with volunteers with <u>No More Deaths</u>, a ministry of the UU Church of Tucson. We will witness the militarization of the border itself, observe "Operation Streamline" hearings designed to criminalize immigrants, and travel into Mexico to visit with recent deportees and hear their stories. We will worship together, and will help each other discern how our ministries and our movement can respond to the need for immigration justice.

Reverend Susan Frederick-Gray, who participated in last year's Clergy Border Witness trip, describes her experience: "The impact of this trip was enhanced by being together as Unitarian Universalists. Our faith, our singing, our prayers became a sacred space to hold the heartbreak and the examples of resistance as one. In this way, what we learned and experienced impacted not just our individual perspectives, but our public voice and commitment as faiths leaders, as UUs."

We invite all UU clergy and seminarians to join us.

Subliminal: How Your Unconscious Mind Rules Your Behavior

RETREAT REPORT: WHO DO WE WANT TO BE? WHERE DO WE WANT TO GO?

First Ever UUCHS Retreat, for all members and friends, November 6-7, Mountain Harbor Resort on Lake Ouachita (tentatively)

At our congregational meeting members approved having a retreat and budgeted \$2,500 for that purpose. Hazel Nino, Carol Stanfill, and Sheri Griffin formed a Retreat Planning Team with Dee Marion.

The Retreat Team met at Dee's and sketched out retreat objectives and plans. The retreat is planned for a weekend (Friday night - Sunday morning) sometime between late September and early November. It was decided that each person will receive a subsidy from the church to enable everyone to attend. The overriding benefit of the retreat will be bonding and learning. The specific purpose of the retreat is to define a common purpose and direction for our church, and to figure out what steps we will take to get there.

The Team checked out many possible venues for this fall but we won't decide on one until we can get a better estimate of costs and funding. The early count of folks who plan to go, without a specific date or personal cost, is 28, with 19 spending the night and eight coming for the day on Saturday. Not all members and friends were in this early count. Facilitator cost is another consideration. Carol is talking with UU leaders who might be a good fit for us.
