



Following from this premise, it sets forth a provocative "alternative" history of the world that is as compellingly readable as any novel. Destiny Disrupted won the Northern California Book Award for Best General Nonfiction of 2009, and it has been translated into nine

languages, including Russian, Dutch, Indonesian, Korean, and Italian.
