August 7 Tiffany Gonzales, Poetry

I'll be briefly discussing the role poetry plays in our lives. I'll then invite anyone who chooses to share a poem or two that has specific meaning for them: whether it be written by someone else or one they wrote themselves. It may be something related to their spirituality (or lack of), humorous, an expression of grief or anything else. They may stand at the mic or read from their seat. They may also wish to share how they feel poetry is or isn't relevant to their lives.

August 14 Jason Nickerson-Tinna, "Quaker practices in a UU life" Exploring Quaker beliefs and practices. How they compare to Unitarian Universalism. And how they can enrich our lives.

Arsala Kahn, A native of Pakistan, Arsala's life changed when she was sixteen years old. She read Alex Haley's *Roots* and the *Autobiography of Malcolm X* as dictated to Alex Haley. Since then, she was attracted to history and political implications and trajectories, especially in relation to race. Arsala was unanimously voted as an adviser for the Black Student Association and the NAACP chapter at her university, both positions which she still serves. With her background in history and political science, Arsala would like to continue her education and address the issues of patriarchy, imperialism and western standards as they apply to humanity. She has a bachelors in history and a masters in social science from Henderson State University. Her thesis covered Malcolm X's influence on Black America.

August 28 Dave Welch, "A central issue for religious people is the role money plays in their lives. There are numerous warnings about the corrupting influence of wealth and in modern times the active promotion of "greed" as a worthwhile goal in life. This in the face of the Biblical blessing of the poor. Dr. David Welch will ask the question -- and it's a puzzler -- What is the role of wealth in our spiritual life?"

By then I'd finally left Catholicism and started getting interested in Unitarianism.


